


The SDTC will be holding several fundraisers in the coming months so check our website (salemctdems.org) and Facebook (Salem) for information on upcoming fundraisers.

SALEM RESIDENTS MADE THEIR VOICES HEARD

Two of the three resolutions voted down at the Special Town Meeting.

I, along with I estimate 50 of our town's people, attended the Special Town Meeting called to consider and vote on three resolutions*:

- A resolution to revise and modify an Ordinance of the Town of Salem, Connecticut, entitled Emergency Responders'
 Awards for the Town of Salem, to authorize the Board of Selectmen to establish the guidelines and a range of exemptions
 for real property taxes for Emergency Responders and to provide for the maximum amount to the statutory level of
 Connecticut General Statutes §12-81w.
- 2. A resolution to adopt an Ordinance of the Town of Salem, Connecticut, providing for the establishment of the Town of Salem Fire and Emergency Services Department pursuant to Connecticut General Statutes §7-301.
- 3. A resolution to approve the Connecticut Green Bank's Connecticut Property Assessed Clean Energy (C-PACE) Program Agreement and authorize the First Selectman to execute and deliver the C-PACE Agreement.

After a lengthy discussion and question and answer session the resolutions #1 and #2 were overwhelmingly defeated and resolution #3 was overwhelmingly passed by the voters. (I will not be further commenting on resolution 3 in this article.)

For resolutions #1 & #2, the first thing that struck me was, after listening to the questions raised by the public and the answers provided by the BOS, the key stakeholders, namely the two volunteer fire companies, were not involved or consulted in the development of the resolutions. It appeared to me to have been done in a vacuum.

The ordinance forwarded by resolution #1 takes the decision of which emergency responders would qualify for the emergency responders awards away from each volunteer fire company Fire Chief and gives it to the BOS. Further, the criteria to be used on which to base the decision was not included in the resolution. For several years both the Gardner Lake and Salem Volunteer Fire Companies have used an agreed upon set of criteria to be used by the Chiefs to make that decision and they submit the list of emergency responders award recipients to the BOS for approval. The BOS had an opportunity to "fix" it by saying "you are right, this needs to be corrected and we should table this." The BOS could then have redrafted the resolution to include the qualification criteria, put the decision back in the Chief's hands, and bring it back to a town meeting for a vote." Instead, they kept trying to push it. The question was asked "why the criteria were not included and the decision on which emergency responders qualify?" The response from the BOS was "we want the ordinance to be simple so if the CT General Statutes governing this were to change, we wouldn't have to redraft the ordinance and hold an expensive town meeting." I find it difficult to believe in the context of a multi-million-dollar town budget a few hundred dollars to notice and hold a town meeting is that significant. One has to wonder what the real motive might be.

The ordinance forwarded by resolution #2 creates a Salem Fire and Emergency Services Department. The new ordinance aimed at simplifying and consolidating the current fire and emergency services structure would create a Town of Salem Fire and Emergency Services Department with a paid administrative fire chief, after appointment, the paid Salem Firefighters/EMTs and support staff as well as the current fire company Chiefs would report to this new town role. This new organization structure was described as an effort improve the working relationship between the current fire companies. The budgets for both of the current fire companies would be consolidated, the operating policies and procedures and equipment would be standardized, as would be the firefighter training. Several members of the public noted that creating a third fire department would not be simplifying the organizational structure. They also raised the question as to who would be in charge of operations at a fire scene. When asked what it would cost to implement the new department, the BOS responded that it would **not** cost anything, the costs for the staffing the new fire department were included the F/Y 24/25 budget. Several people noted that if the costs for the new fire department are included in the budget, it is costing the town money and can be expected to increase every year. Several members of each of the current fire companies indicated they have been working together for years and when firefighters from each company arrive at a fire scene there has never been a problem with coordination or working together. Lastly, creating a new fire department would require a change to the Town's Charter. While there might be some potential improvements derived from the proposed consolidated organization there are other ways to achieve those that does not require creating a new fire department and incurring all the associated costs. One possible way to consolidate the administrative functions would be to create a Fire and Emergency Services Commission (a change to the Town Charter required) staffed by volunteers and the Chief of each of the current fire companies having a seat on the Commission. The Commission would manage the budget much the same way the Board of Education does and submit it to the Board of Finance.

It is clear to me that the development of either of these resolutions and corresponding ordinances were not thoroughly vetted. Furthermore, the major stakeholders (current fire companies and staffs) were not directly involved in the development of either of these resolutions and corresponding ordinances, thus, it is not surprising that resolutions #1 and #2 were voted down.

Perhaps, in addition, the BOS did not expect such a large turnout for the Town Meeting, however it does show that the people of Salem care very much about the services in town, especially those related to emergency and fire safety.





August 1933 – A published story documented George Spicer's account of sighting the Loch Ness Monster.


August 16, 1896 - The discovered gold in Rabbit Creek Alaska sparked the start of the Great Klondike Gold Rush.

August 17, 1978 - The first hot air balloon trip across the Atlantic Ocean began on this day in 1978.


August 18, 1920 – The 19th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution came into effect on this day in 1920 giving women the Right to Vote in the US.
