OPINION – Enough Is Enough

It Is Long Past Time For Common Sense Federal Gun Control Legislation

It has happened again, this time in Winder Georgia, two innocent 14-year-old school kids and two teachers were killed and an additional nine others, (8 students and 1 teacher) were wounded, in the latest school shooting. Apalachee High School in Winder Georgia joins the list of communities that have experienced and must now live with the aftermath of a school shooting. So how many school shootings have there been since Columbine?¹ That depends on how you sort the data:


- Any shooting on school property since Columbine: 2,032 school shootings
- One or more victims shot since Columbine: 1,143 school shootings
- 4+ wounded or killed since Columbine: 59 school shootings
- 4+ killed since Columbine: 8 school shootings
- Active Shooter since Columbine: 133 school shootings
- Pre-Planned Attacks since Columbine: 97 school shootings
- Near misses since Columbine: 272 school shootings


No matter how you slice up the school shooting data, the trend line is going up and the problem is getting worse.1 After the Columbine shooting many improvements were made in school security, including School Resource Officers stationed in schools, better law enforcement response policy and tactics in dealing with a school shooting event. What more physical security, classroom lockdowns, improved law enforcement response policy and tactics haven't done over the last 25 years is prevent these attacks. By all accounts everything was done right in response to the Apalachee High School shooting yet we have two children and two adults dead, four families grieving, and another 1894 school children joined the more than 338,000² school children that have experienced gun violence at school. The weapon used in the most recent shooting at Apalachee High School was an AR-style platform rifle. Both the rifle and the round it fires were designed in the 1950's for the military. The result was the M16 for our troops and the AR-15 for civilians. When will the right of our school children and teachers tor for that matter any citizen the right to live out-weigh the right to own an AR-15 style weapon? I don't want to hear one elected official offer their "thoughts and prayers" to the grieving families. They have done that for the last 25 years and it hasn't worked. I don't want to hear one elected official say "now not the time to discuss gun control' if not now, when? After another 3 or 5 or 50 or deaths? What is the magic number? We know how many have died in the 25 years since Columbine so we can calculate the rate and therefore we can calculate when we would reach the magic number. Well, it is long past the time for serious federal legislative action to ban this type of weapon for public ownership, universal background checks, and implement "red flag" laws. It is time for action not thoughts and prayers.





OPINION - GARDNER LAKE & HYDRILLA

Parking And Over Crowding Are Not The Only Problems At The Boat Launch And Gardner Lake State Park

On Tuesday September 3rd the Salem Inland Wetlands and Conservation Commission (IWCC) invited the Montville and Bozrah IWCCs to the Salem IWCC meeting held at the Salem School Library for a presentation on hydrilla found in Gardner Lake. Greg Bugbee from the CT Agricultural Experimentation Station Department of Environmental Sciences presented their findings and recommendations to control this invasive aquatic plant to an audience of concerned Salem citizens as well as State Senator Martha Marx and Rich Knotek and Nick Menapace, candidates for CT State Representative for the 34th and 37th Districts.

"Hydrilla was first identified in the Connecticut River near Glastonbury, CT in 2016 and has since spread to Essex, Connecticut. It has also spread into the river's many coves, tributaries, and boat basins. The Connecticut River hydrilla is unique from other known hydrilla strains, as it is genetically distinct. The plant's biology is largely unknown at this time. The highly invasive aquatic plant, Hydrilla verticillata, known commonly as 'hydrilla' or 'water thyme' was first detected in the Connecticut River in 2016 around Glastonbury, CT. In 2019 and 2020 a survey was conducted from Agawam, MA south to the Long



Island Sound. Hydrilla was found as far north as Agawam, MA. The 2019 and 2020 surveys of hydrilla in Connecticut/Massachusetts waters, confirm the plant is spreading and the risk of it spreading further to other regional waterbodies is significant. Fragments of the plant, which are easily caught and transported by boats and boat trailers, can sprout roots and establish new populations. Fragments also float and are capable of dispersing via wind and water currents.

What is hydrilla?

Hydrilla is an aquatic plant that has earned the illustrious title "world's worst invasive aquatic plant". Listed as a federal noxious weed, hydrilla has made its home in just about every conceivable freshwater habitat including: rivers, streams, lakes, ponds, marshes, canals, ditches and reservoirs.

Hydrilla was first discovered in the United States in the 1960s in Florida. Since then, it has spread to many parts of the U.S.

Hydrilla can grow in a wide variety of water conditions (e.g., high/low nutrients, high/low turbidity, variable pH, up to 7% salinity) and water temperatures. Unlike most native aquatic plants, hydrilla is capable of growing under extremely low light conditions. Hydrilla is able to begin photosynthesizing much earlier in the morning than native plants so it is able to capture most of the carbon dioxide in the water (which limits growth of other plants). Hydrilla grows very rapidly (it can double its biomass every two weeks in summer) and has no natural predators or diseases to limit its population.

Dense infestations of hydrilla can shade or crowd out all other native aquatic plants, alter water chemistry, cause dramatic swings in dissolved oxygen levels, increase water temperatures, and affect the diversity and abundance of fish populations.¹"

How Hydrilla Spreads

Hydrilla propagates through fragmentation, meaning that when it breaks apart, fragments of the plant may float downriver and re-root, creating another mat of hydrilla at a new location. The hydrilla in the Connecticut River is different than any other species of hydrilla found. It does not have tubers on the roots of the plant, as is usual for hydrilla. Because hydrilla spreads through fragmentation, when paddlers, boaters and wildlife become entangled in hydrilla, they can spread the plant to reaches downriver.

Additionally, when boaters move from water body to waterbody, hydrilla fragments can remain in or on the vessel and be introduced to new waterbodies that way. Once in a new location, this invasive species repopulates itself rapidly and with strength.²"

We all know that parking, overcrowding and other issues are a problem at the Boat Launch and Gardner Lake State Park and that the State of CT, DEEP (the owner) has done little to address these problems. As a result of the inaction of the DEEP, the Town of Salem has had to spend tax payer dollars to have the Resident Troopers and tow-trucks at the boat launch and park to enforce the parking regulations and park capacity.

With the discovery of hydrilla in Gardner Lake as well as several other lakes in CT, the DEEP needs to take immediate and decisive action to control and irradicate it in Gardner Lake and to prevent its spread to other waterways, lakes, and ponds. The boat launch should be closed until a system is put in place to ensure watercraft coming in are free of hydrilla and a manned wash station to ensure watercraft coming out of the lake are free of hydrilla. Additionally, the State Park should be closed until the DEEP can staff the park to control its use or a system to reimburse the Town of Salem for the costs incurred for Salem to manage the park.

A General Election is where all eligible voters elect candidates to office. In Connecticut, there is a general election every year.

YOUR SAY - YOUR DAY

WHAT is Early Voting?

Early Voting allows you to vote in person safely and securely before Election Day.

WHAT SHOULD I EXPECT at the Early Voting location?

When you arrive at the Early Voting location, you will check in and be verified as an eligible voter. You will then receive your ballot with an envelope. You will complete your ballot at a privacy booth and seal it in the approved envelope. Before you leave, place the sealed envelope in the secure receptacle as instructed by the election officials. Ballots will be secured unopened until Election Day.

EARLY VOTING, GENERAL ELECTION, NOVEMBER 5TH (continued from p 5)

WHEN will ballots be counted?

Ballots cast during Early Voting will be sealed and stored securely in each town. They will be opened and counted on Election Day. HOW DOES EARLY VOTING DIFFER from voting by absentee ballot? Absentee Ballot voting requires a reason (from a list of six, found at MyVote.CT.gov). Early Voting is available to every eligible voter without a specific reason. Early Voting may be done only in-person, not via mail or drop box.

HOW MANY EARLY VOTING LOCATIONS will be in each city or town?

In Salem there is one Early Voting location and it is the Town Hall.

CAN I VOTE on weekends?

Yes. Early Voting includes Saturdays and Sundays for most elections (see calendar for specific dates).

HOW IS IT ENSURED people do not vote twice?

The election official at your Early Voting location will record that you have cast your ballot, preventing you from voting early at any other location, submitting an absentee ballot, or voting on Election Day.

DOES EARLY VOTING EXIST in other states?

Although new to Connecticut this year, 46 other states already offer some form of Early Voting.

WHAT hasn't changed?

You can still vote via Absentee Ballot or on Election Day as usual. Elections in Connecticut are still safe and secure.







ON THIS DAY IN SEPTEMBER

September 1, 1939	Hitler invaded Poland; thus, began World War II in Europe
September 2, 1789	The third Presidential cabinet department, the U.S. Treasury, was established by Congress.
September 2, 1945	President Truman proclaims V-J Day upon the surrender of the Japanese
September 2, 1962	Soviet Russia agreed to send arms to Cuba, leading to the October Missile Crisis after the shipments were discovered by the U.S.
September 3, 1783	Treaty of Paris signed that ended the American Revolutionary War
September 4, 1609	The island of Manhattan was discovered by navigator Henry Hudson.
September 4, 1781	City of Los Angeles founded by Spanish Governor Felipe de Neve
September 5, 1774	The First Continental Congress assembled in Philadelphia with 56 delegates, representing every colony, except Georgia. Attendants included Patrick Henry, George Washington, Sam Adams and John Hancock.
September 5-6, 1972	Eleven members of the Israeli Olympic Team were killed during an attack on the Olympic Village in Munich by members of the Black September faction of the Palestinian Liberation Army.
September 8, 1900	The worst weather disaster in U.S. history: a hurricane with winds of 120 mph struck Galveston, Texas, killing over 8,000 persons.
September 9, 1776	The U.S.A. came into existence as the Continental Congress changed the name of the new American nation from the United Colonies to the United States.
September 11, 2001	The worst terrorist attack in U.S. history.
September 12, 1990	Treaty was signed to reunite East and West Germany
September 14, 1901	Eight days after being shot, President William McKinley died from wounds suffered during an assassination attempt. Theodore Roosevelt then took over the presidency.
September 16, 1620	The Mayflower ship departed from Plymouth, England, bound for America with 102 passengers and a small crew.
September 18, 1947	The U.S. Air Force was established as a separate military service.
September 19, 1893	New Zealand became the first country to grant women the right to vote.
September 22, 1862	President Abraham Lincoln issued a preliminary Emancipation Proclamation freeing the slaves in territories held by Confederates as of January 1, 1863.
September 25, 1513	Balboa first sighted the Pacific Ocean after crossing the Isthmus of Panama.
September 25, 1789	The first U.S. Congress proposed 12 Amendments to the Constitution, ten of which, comprising the Bill of Rights, were ratified.
September 26, 1960	The first-ever televised presidential debate occurred between presidential candidates John F. Kennedy and Richard M. Nixon. Many who watched were inclined to say Kennedy 'won' the debate, while those who listened only to the radio thought Nixon did better. Nixon, who declined to use makeup, appeared somewhat haggard looking on TV in contrast to Kennedy.

September 29, 1789 Congress created the United States Army, consisting of 1,000 enlisted men and officers.
